The rise of Traditionalism in Russia

Since the 1990s, Russian and international politics have seen the rise of Traditionalism, a philosophy with origins in alternative religion that now finds its most important expression in in right-wing radicalism. Crucial to this development has been Alexander Dugin, a former Soviet dissident, then a countercultural figure under President Yeltsin, and now a respected commentator under President Putin, sometimes described in the Western media as “Putin’s brain.” This is going too far—Putin has a brain of his own, and his policies are guided more by pragmatism than by ideology. But Dugin and Traditionalism do matter, in Russia and beyond. In this lecture, Mark Sedgwick will introduce Dugin, explain Traditionalism and its rise in Russia, and comment on the causes and impacts of these developments.
